
Brother Thomas Jude Jensen, CFC

Brother Jensen was born on November 22, 1940, in the Bronx, the son of George and Mary Hermina Jensen. He entered the Congregation on September 10, 1955, and took his final vows on June 27, 1966. He attended St Anthony of Padua and Cardinal Hayes High School in the Bronx. It was there as a freshman at the age of 15 that Br. Jensen would enter the Juniorate of the Christian Brothers. He spent the rest of his life serving in Christian Brother schools including Essex Catholic, Power Memorial Academy, Iona Prep and Bergen Catholic High School. Br. Jensen received his BA degree in classical language and literature from Iona College and a MA from Manhattan College. Rev. Brother Thomas Jude C.F.C., passed away on February 7, 2011. Brother Jensen spent 12 years at Power from 1965-1977 teaching Mathematics, Religion, English and Latin. Brother J touched many lives and provided a strong role model for his students and players. Ask any student or player who knew Br. J and they will tell you what a great coach, mentor, and teacher

he was. When you ask many Power Alumni who were coached by Brother J, they would say that he was one of the major cornerstones in laying the foundation for the basketball program for the many years. When you look at the four Basketball City Championship teams, Brother J's teams were the foundation of this basketball powerhouse winning multiple freshman and JV City Championships and grooming many raw and immature players into all city basketball players. Brother J also loved baseball and was Power JV baseball coach for many years, once again, feeding our Varsity team with solid talent to help them win multiple Bronx Manhattan Baseball championships. After leaving Power, Brother Jensen continued serving the Christian Brother schools including Iona Prep (1978-1983) and Bergen Catholic for almost a quarter century. Similar to what his legacy was at Power, he taught several levels of Mathematics, as well as Religion and Latin, and was the coach of the J.V. baseball and basketball teams. The contributions of this highly respected coach laid the groundwork for the outstanding success of the varsity teams of both programs during his association with them. At Iona and Bergen, he established himself as one of the most respected instructors in both schools' history and has already been inducted into both Iona Prep and Bergen Catholic Alumni Hall of Fame. His career coaching feats were recognized by his peers and was also inducted into the CHSAA Basketball Hall of Fame.

Bergen Catholic High School Hall of Fame bio

Br. Thomas Jude Jensen, CFC established himself as one of the most highly respected instructors in Bergen Catholic's proud history. He earned a BA at Iona College and an MA at Manhattan College and accepted teaching assignments at Essex Catholic, Cardinal Hayes, Power Memorial Academy (where he coached future NBA players Ed Searcy and Len Elmore), and Iona Prep, before coming to Bergen Catholic. His arrival at BC in the fall of 1984 began a term that lasted almost one-quarter of a century. He taught several levels of Mathematics at BC as well as Religion and Latin. His varied interests inspired him to become Moderator of the Bicycle, Latin and Greek Mythology Clubs. Br. Jensen's love of sports quickly became evident to the BC community when he took over the junior varsity baseball and basketball squads, quietly providing his firm leadership and instilling the importance of basic fundamentals and discipline into each of his teams. The contributions of this highly regarded coach laid the groundwork for outstanding success of the varsity teams of both programs during his association with them. Br. Jensen came to the rescue of the athletic program during the 1987-88 school year, when he accepted an appointment to the position of Athletic Director.



A funeral mass will be held at Holy Family Church, Mayflower Avenue, New Rochelle, NY 10804 on Friday at 9:30 AM. Burial will follow at the Christian Brothers Cemetery in West Park, NY. 

Power Memorial "B" varsity 1968-1969

This team grew from a suggestion by the Athletic Director of St. Francis Prep to Br. Sirignano into a full-fledged reality by September of 1968.

Its prime reason for existence was to afford an extra and vital year of experience to juniors who would otherwise sit the varsity A bench. It also was intended to afford seniors who would not otherwise play interscholastic basketball a chance to do so in a Power uniform.

Five seniors were instrumental in the B team's success: Captain Dennis Cook contributed hustle, defense, aggressiveness and leadership: Captain Bill Galbavy's tremendous leaping ability and strength, coupled with a fine jump shot, decided many a close game for Power; Peter Pryor's great speed and defense, Bob Bendik's strength and hustle, and John Keirans' all-around team play enhanced the seniors' contribution to this year's season.

The juniors on the B Varsity were led by the rugged team of Billy Mannix (an AAPS all-star) and Bob Akalski in the back court, this too provided the Power B's with leadership, defense and scoring. Juniors Steve Donohue (MVP of the AAPS Tournament), who led the team scorers with a 16.2 ppg average, and John Conboy (our "portable brick wall") provided rebounding, defense and scoring punch. Our fine juniors were rounded out by hustling, fine-shooting Eldred Richards, fleet-footed, deadly Freddie Aniag, steady Mark Basuino, and rugged Larry Smith; Edwin Santiago missed much of the season due to injuries.

The steady, unselfish character of this team (AAPS Champs) was greatly aided by the encouragement and support of Br. McNamara and Br. Jensen. It was an amazing first year.



Frosh Basketball

Power Memorial's Freshman Basketball Team started off with a strike against them. Before the regular season even started, they lost two of their best shooters in John Holland and "Smokey Joe" Santos. Most teams would have given up right there, but inspired by their great coach, Brother Jensen (who kept their confidence up all year), and a tremendous pride in wearing a Power uniform, they just tried harder; and it paid off. They came in second in Division 1 of the CHSAA freshman basketball league with a respectable 8—3 record and finished the playoffs with an overall record of 14—6, plus third place in the Bronx-Manhattan CHSAA.

The Frosh were led by their center, Kevin Doyle, who was their leading rebounder and scorer. They had two fine-shooting guards in Jim McKenna and Jim Campbell and a great playmaker in Nestor Sabater. Terence Pusey proved to be a great asset in helping Doyle off the boards and was also a fine shooter. Rodney Evans, who broke into the starting lineup late in the year, helped greatly in the playoffs with his fine shooting and rebounding. Added to these was the great clutch play of Jackie Maine, whose defensive job was always the other team's high scorer; he was responsible for many of the team's wins.

Men who gave great moral support on the bench, but who also turned in the job when called upon, were Dennis Neary, Dennis Neidhardt, Kevin Powers, John Phillips, John Deguzman, Gregory Seeley, and Eugene Saunders; Neary, Seeley and Deguzman were good-shooting guards, while Neidhardt and Powers were strong rebounders at the forward position. Saunders and Phillips are both tall, strong centers with plenty of potential and a great future at Power.



In October of 1970, it was evident to the coaching staff that this year's freshman team could become one of the strongest that Power had had in recent years. Abundant talent, height, speed and shooting were all very much in evidence. Two things can happen to this kind of a group, however; individual talents can destroy all team effort, or all this ability can blend into an unbeatable combination. 


Teacher Honored





explosiveness and desire have been some of the qualities seen in teammates like Ralph Felcin, Felix Martinez and Val Minnefield,




Private School All-Stars Show That Sparkle

This was an extraordinary basketball season for the Power Memorial Panthers who captured the Manhattan-Bronx CHSAA title and finished the year with a 22-5 record.

Therefore, it comes as little surprise that two Panther aces, Larry Petty and Edwin Moss, head The News 1977 Private High School all-Star team.

And for guiding the Power quintet to the city final before bowing in the final minutes to Nazareth of Brooklyn, the Panther interim coach, brother Thomas Jensen, is our Coach of the Year.

"I am honored to have the respect of my fellow coaches," said Jensen, who incidentally is being transfered from Power after his one-year stint as varsity coach.

"I am primarily a freshman and junior varsity coach," added Jensen. "And that is what I will return to at my next school."

Rounding out The News All-Star squad are: Jeffrey Carrion, Rice High; Martin Mannion, of Regis, and Ernie DelGatto of Mt. St. Michaels. Here's why!

JEFFREY CARRION (Rice)—A great ballhandler who easily moved inside and outside grabbing re-

bounds and passing off to the open man, Carrion is an all-around offensive threat. A 6-2 guard who is fast and strong, Carrion also chipped in 17.8 points per game for Rice. The only junior to make The News team, Carrion is an odd-on favorite to repeat next year.

MARTIN MANNION (Regis)—Marty led the CHSAA in scoring this season averaging 29 points per game on 54% shooting from the floor. Considered one of the top players in the city the 6-3 guard also contributed 12 rebounds a game for Coach O'Brien. Voted the MVP of Division IV, Mannion will play at Princeton University in the fall.

ERNIE DELGATTO (Mt. St. Michaels)—At 6-6 and 220 pounds, DelGatto was the Mount's "big man" averaging 18 points a game from his forward position. A three-year starter at the Mount, DelGatto should have a bright future as a college forward.

LARRY PETTY (Power Memorial)—At 6-10 and 240 pounds, Petty could be the best big man to play for Power since Lew Alcindor (aka Kareem Abdul Jabbar) threw in baskets there. A News all-star repeat. Petty averaged 13 points and as many rebounds per game and was a standout again on defense this season. And, because he is first coming into

his own as a basketball star, Petty is being hawked daily by college and pro scouts.

EDWIN MOSS (Power Memorial)—Moss is considered the best all-around player in the history of Power basketball. Averaging just 10 points, the 6-2 guard also made five steals and eight assists per game totaling 30 points for his team on the stat sheets. A great leaper, Moss also pulled down eight rebounds a game, mostly at crucial times. "Ed Moss should have been named the coach of the year," said Coach Jensen.



In that year, however, Jensen piloted Power to a 22-5 season and proved himself to be the coach for all seasons.

Jensen is currently waiting for notification as to where he will be teaching and coaching next season. But, Power's loss will be another school's gain.

"There is work to be done with other boys at other schools," Jensen said. "I guess I'll just have to start all over again at my next school."

With Jensen's talent and ability to work with young boys, a Jensen-coached team should be heard from in the future.

Br. Jensen came to Power in September of 1967 and over the following 10 years taught Mathematics, Religion, English and Latin across all four grade levels. Equally versatile in the athletic arena as he was in the classroom, he coached Freshman, JV and Varsity B basketball, winning 3 City Championships along the way. More significantly, it was his coaching of young players in their formative years that helped lay the foundation for the '70, '72 and '76 Varsity City Championship teams. He had the same effect coaching JV baseball, honing skills and instilling confidence in his players on their way to the Varsity team. Br. Jensen, a member of the CHSAA Hall of Fame, went on to teach and coach at Iona Prep and Bergen Catholic High School until his death in 2011.
